LANGUAGE PROJECTS

1. Newspaper Article: Write a well-structured article (250-300 words) on a current event, including headings, subheadings and images.

2. Short Story: Craft a compelling short story (300-350 words) incorporating literary devices (e.g., metaphor, simile, imagery).

3. Debate Script: Prepare a debate script (300-350 words) on a topical issue (e.g., social media's impact, climate change).

LITERATURE PROJECTS

1. Book Review: Write a detailed review (250-300 words) of a prescribed novel (e.g., "The Diary of a Young Girl" or "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn").

2. Poetry Analysis: Analyse a poem from the textbook (e.g., "The Road Not Taken" or "Legend of the Northland"), exploring themes, imagery and symbolism.

3. Character Sketch: Create a comprehensive character sketch (300-350 words) of a protagonist from a novel that you have gone through in this break.

B. Choose one project from each section (Language and Literature).

LANGUAGE PROJECTS

3. Script Writing: Write a short script (250-300 words) for a conversation between two historical figures or fictional characters.

LITERATURE PROJECTS

1. Book Review: Write a detailed review (200-250 words) of a novel (e.g., "The Secret Garden" or "The Giver").

2. Poetry Exploration: Explore a poem from the CBSE curriculum (e.g., "Geography Lesson" or "The School Boy"), analysing themes, imagery, and symbolism.

3. Character Analysis: Create a character map or diagram (with descriptions) for a protagonist from any novel.
